It has been their home for thousands of years and will continue to be their home in the face of future climate change. The First Nations Engagement Plan is for both the CLLMM Research Centre and for the First Nations community. It is designed to provide guidance to the CLLMM Research Centre for engagement with the First Nations communities in the region, ensure this engagement is always culturally appropriate and in the interest of theFirst Nations people.
